COMMUNITY IMPACT & CHANGE IN 2021

11 women chose to call Benevolence Farm home

1,181 nights of safe and secure housing provided to women exiting prisons

35 formerly incarcerated people referred to housing and community resources in North Carolina outside of the Benevolence Farm program

> 268 bars of soap donated through our Soap for Incarcerated People Project

592 people benefitted from Benevolence Farm Products nationwide

2021 SPECIAL INITIATIVES

Tiny Home Community

At Benevolence Farm, we take resident feedback very seriously. Many residents and alumni voiced that it was difficult to reenter the community after Benevolence Farm because they hadn't had a chance to acclimate to independent living when living in a shared community house. Therefore, in response to that feedback, we launched the Tiny Home Community Fund in partnership with Haven Developers.

After several charrettes, we worked with residents to build a site plan and design six tiny homes that we hope to build upon completion of fundraising between 2023 and 2024.



Legal Fund

The Legal Fund was not originally in our strategic plan, but after several mothers reached out seeking assistance with child reunification, we knew we needed to fill the gap in legal services. Unfortunately, it is costly for many women, especially women with an incarceration history, to obtain legal representation to get their children back. Thanks to donors like you, the Legal Fund supported three mothers who are all now in the process of reuniting with their children thanks to their legal representation and personal advocacy.

We are grateful for the investments made into the three critical areas:


\$151,729 for our Second Chances Fund
