

Housing and Community Resources

CHALLENGES WE FACED IN 2023



Capacity: Despite increasing our bed number by 66% in 2022, we had to turn down 43 applicants in 2023 due purely to lack of space.



Housing Demand: Outside of our direct housing program, we received an unprecedented amount of inquires from across the state asking for financial assistance so they could secure a rental home after incarceration. Sometimes, they were required to provide \$700 - \$2,200 in security deposits



Cash Flow: While our finances were much healthier in 2023, we still find ourselves affected by the summer slump and other quieter periods of giving. It is our goal in 2024 to improve our monthly cash flow by tapping into creative marketing efforts to boost our social enterprise sales.

NEW INITIATIVES IN 2023



Housing First Fund

The Housing First Fund launched in 2023 with a \$10,000 grant from Coastal Federal Credit Union. This fund was created to support formerly incarcerated people as they returned to the communities of their choice. Many people with criminal records face immense barriers when it comes to finding rental housing after prison. It was our intention to alleviate these barriers by paying for security deposits.



Bonding Families

Bonding Families is the brainchild of Benevolence Farm alumna and staff member Mona Evans. As a foremerly incarcerated mother, Mona had the logistical support she needed at the Farm, but she felt isolated in her motherhood experience and wanted more social and emotional support. She also noticed this to be true for other formerly incarcerated mothers. Thus, Bonding Families was born! This effort provides safe, judgement-free spaces for formerly incarcerated mothers to heal together and support one another.
